The Greenville Town Council approved a resolution last night to begin negotiations to sell its troubled water utility to Indiana-American Water Co.

The council also reached an agreement that calls for Indiana-American to become the funding and construction agent of the utility's expansion project, regardless of whether it buys the utility.

Greenville received approval from the Indiana Utility Regulatory Commission last month to raise water rates 28.4 percent and to issue up to \$770,000 in bonds to pay for a much-needed ex-

pansion, which includes building a new water tank and installing new lines. Last night's action means the bonds won't be issued and the rates will not be raised.

In fact, if the council approves the sale, water rates would drop by 27.9 percent to bring the utility in line with what Indiana American charges New Albany residents. A customer served by the Greenville utility who uses 5,000 gallons of water a month now pays \$19.45.

"I just think selling the utility will be much better for the town," council member Pat Sappenfield said.

The town, in essence, has virtually agreed to sell the utility, but details of the contract still have to be worked out.

Indiana-American serves 18 towns and cities and has more than 156,000 customers.

Greenville's water utility is too small to adequately serve its 1,100 customers and can't handle the town's rapid expansion of recent years. This summer residents were plagued by low water pressure.

Richard Hargraves, president of Indiana-American, said his firm has the expertise to run the utility. Hargraves said that if all goes well, the sale could be completed by April. "We didn't know Greenville had water problems until we saw articles in the paper and the approval of the rate increase," Hargraves said. "We'll work with the community to keep up water demand, and at the present I know of no reason why the expansion project should not go forward as planned."

That is good news to the two dozen residents who packed Town Hall last night.

Ervin Rickard, a member of the water utility advisory board, welcomed the proposed sale.

The Town Council doesn't "have the money

The Town Council doesn't "have the money to run it. If I ran a business like they ran the utility, I would have been bankrupt a long time ago," Rickard said.

The Greenville utility's woes began two years ago when the town's reservoir was closed by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency because the water didn't meet federal standards.

Greenville had to buy water from neighboring utilities, and the Indiana Utility Regulatory Commission granted the town a 34 percent rate increase to cover those costs. But that still wasn't enough, and the Town Council went back to the commission in May for a 46 percent rate increase.

In June the Town Council voted to remove the utility

from the purview of the regulatory commission, as has been done with many non-profit utilities like Greenville's, since that became possible five years ago.

That move was challenged by a coalition of residents and was to be on the November ballot. In the meantime the state commission granted a 28 percent rate increase.

Wayne Martin, who has led the fight against the rate increase, said the Town Council should have tried to sell the utility years ago.

"It was obvious a long time that this was the direction things were going to take. It is the only feasible solution," Martin said.

Selling the water utility will also allow the town to avoid selling \$770,000 in bonds for renovation of water lines and a water tower in the Greenville area.

Indiana-American -- a public utility that serves 18 other small towns with more than 150,000 cus tomers — would assume the repoys tion expenses.

The resolution approved last night is the first step toward selling the utility.

Three appraisers - costing the town from \$5,000 to \$15,000 — will assess the value, of the Greenville water utility and give their findings in 30 to 45 days. Indiana-American president Richard ... Hardgraves said his company could purchase the utility by April.

Poor water pressure has been a problem for the town's 1,100 water 2 utility customers this summer.

In June, the town board voted t leave the Indiana Utilities Regula tory Commission, a step that would 🕏 have exempted the utility's rates from state control. Some residents, opposed to the move gathered signary tures on a petition calling for a your on it in November.

Wayne Martin, one of the resi dents against the town leaving IURC jurisdiction, said the decision to sell the utility in "the best thing to happen."

"Wo've been trying to push them to sell," Martin said. "It's definitely going in the right direction."

Martin said he's glad Indiana-American is part of the IURC.

American is part of the IURC which regulates water rates.

The proposed sale could actually reduce rates by 28 percent, said Bill Fender, advisory committee chair for the town board, saving the town 'a potential \$93,000."

"That's certainly in the best interest of the town," Fender said.
